Parent Interviewing Tips



- Show up. Be prepared and on time.
- **Break the ice.** Ask about hobbies, interests and siblings.
- Be thoughtful. Review his or her resume in advance and put some time into your questions.
- Listen carefully. Put away your phone and make eye contact.
- Dress the part. Wear what you expect your interviewee to wear.
- Be enthusiastic. Excitement is contagious, so be passionate about the opportunity.
- Make connections. Same major? Both runners? Lighten the tone by finding things in common.
- Be thought-provoking. Ask questions that lead to insightful, on-the-spot answers.
- Ask for references. It's never too early to instill the need for credibility.
- **Be clear about what you want.** Make sure you're both on the same page.



- Ask rapid-fire questions. These are kids: give them time to process and respond.
- Interrupt. Teens like anyone will perform better when they feel at ease.
- Complain about past experiences. And never mention another child by name.
- Write off a candidate during the interview. Let the impression sink in a little, and take the entire scope of his or her qualifications into account.
- Set a bad example. Mirror the behavior you expect in return.
- Be condescending or disrespectful.
